

A LANDMARK ELECTION AT THE HARVARD LAW REVIEW

The editors of the 103-year-old Harvard Law Review have elected their first black president. Barack Obama, son of a Kenyan economist and an American anthropologist, is a Columbia graduate who spent four years heading a community development project in Chicago before entering law school. Obama called his election a signal to black students at all levels that they can still achieve, although "discriminatory barriers remain formidable and there are tremendous educational problems, particularly for the poor. . . . "
